 7. Conclusion: Give the essence of every paragraph in short and discuss them to the point.
 8. Reference: If the information is taken from somewhere then source of the same needs to be mention in an Article.
 9. Student Details: Students are required to send their Name, Registration No., Stage of CA Curriculum pursuing, Name of the Firm (if pursuing Articleship) and a Student’s Photo.

IMPACT OF COVID – 19 ON POLLUTION

Introduction:

In late 2019, a novel infectious disease with human to human transmission (COVID-19) was identified in Wuhan China, which now has turned into a global pandemic. The pandemic has caused a global reduction in economic activity and although this is major cause for concern, the ramping down of human activity appears to have had a positive impact on the environment. Industrial and transport emissions and effluents have reduced, and measurable data supports the clearing of pollutants in the atmosphere, soil and water. This effect is also in contrast to carbon emissions, which shot up by 5 percent after the global financial crash over a decade ago, as a result of stimulus spending on fossil fuel use to kickstart the global economy.

There's clear water in the Venice canals, blue skies over Delhi and wild animals are roaming boldly in locked-down cities. The oil industry and airlines are floundering in this new world, and carbon emissions are falling fast.

Countries all over the world have implemented some sort of lockdown to slow down its infection and mitigate it. Lockdown due to COVID-19 has drastic effects on social and economic fronts. However, this lockdown also has some positive effect on natural environment. On the one hand of the global economy has been disrupted causing economies of many countries to collapse, the governments and international bodies are continuously taking steps in the reviving the global economy out of this pit created by COVID-19. And on the other hand, the outbreak of COVID-19 is a green signal for the environment, where every day we are seeing the air quality is getting better and better in the most polluted cities like Delhi, Mumbai, London, Las Vegas, Shanghai, etc. The Ozone depletion which was a big problem for the mankind since many years has been resorted. The biggest hole in Ozone has now been fixed.

Even the water bodies are taking the advantages of the outbreak as lockdown been imposed by several countries has put shutters on the industries and factories and the humans are being locked in their houses. Hence no polluted

Water are being disposed off in the water making it drinkable and healthy. Ganga is one of the examples where the water has become drinkable after several decades.

Humans are being pushed to stay at home and follow social distancing has dramatically reduced the noise pollution as well. Now the chirping of birds can be heard nearby our houses and is no longer a ringtone in electronic devices.

However, this blessings has a great disguise over the other aspects in the world. The outbreak of pandemic Covid-19 all over the world has disturbed the political, social, economic, religious and financial structures of the whole world. World's topmost economies such as the US, China, UK, Germany, France, Italy, Japan and many others are at the verge of collapse.

Besides, Stock Markets around the world have been pounded and oil prices have fallen off a cliff. In just a week 3.3 million Americans applied for unemployment and a week later another 6.6 million people started searching for jobs. In India the unemployment rate also climber to all time high 23.4%. Also, many experts on economic and financial matters have warned about the worsening condition of global economic and financial structure. Such as KristalinaGeorgieva, Managing Director of International Monitory Fund (IMF), explained that "a recession at least as bad as during the Global Financial Crisis or worse". Moreover, Covid-19 is harming the global economy because the world has been experiencing the most difficult economic situation since World War-II.

When it comes to the human cost of the Coronavirus pandemic it is immeasurable therefore all countries need to work together with cooperation and coordination to protect the human beings as well as limit the economic damages. For instance, the lockdown has restricted various businesses such as travelling to contain the virus consequently this business is coming to an abrupt halt globally.

While implementing the recovery measures for the economy the government should not lower environmental standards, suspend environmental monitoring requirements and reduce environmental enforcement, in the belief

That this is necessary to salvage economic growth amid COVID-19.

It would be a mistake to assume that there is a trade-off between saving livelihoods and protecting the environment. The crisis of COVID-19 has highlighted that improving the quality of air in our country is not a matter of choice but an emergency.

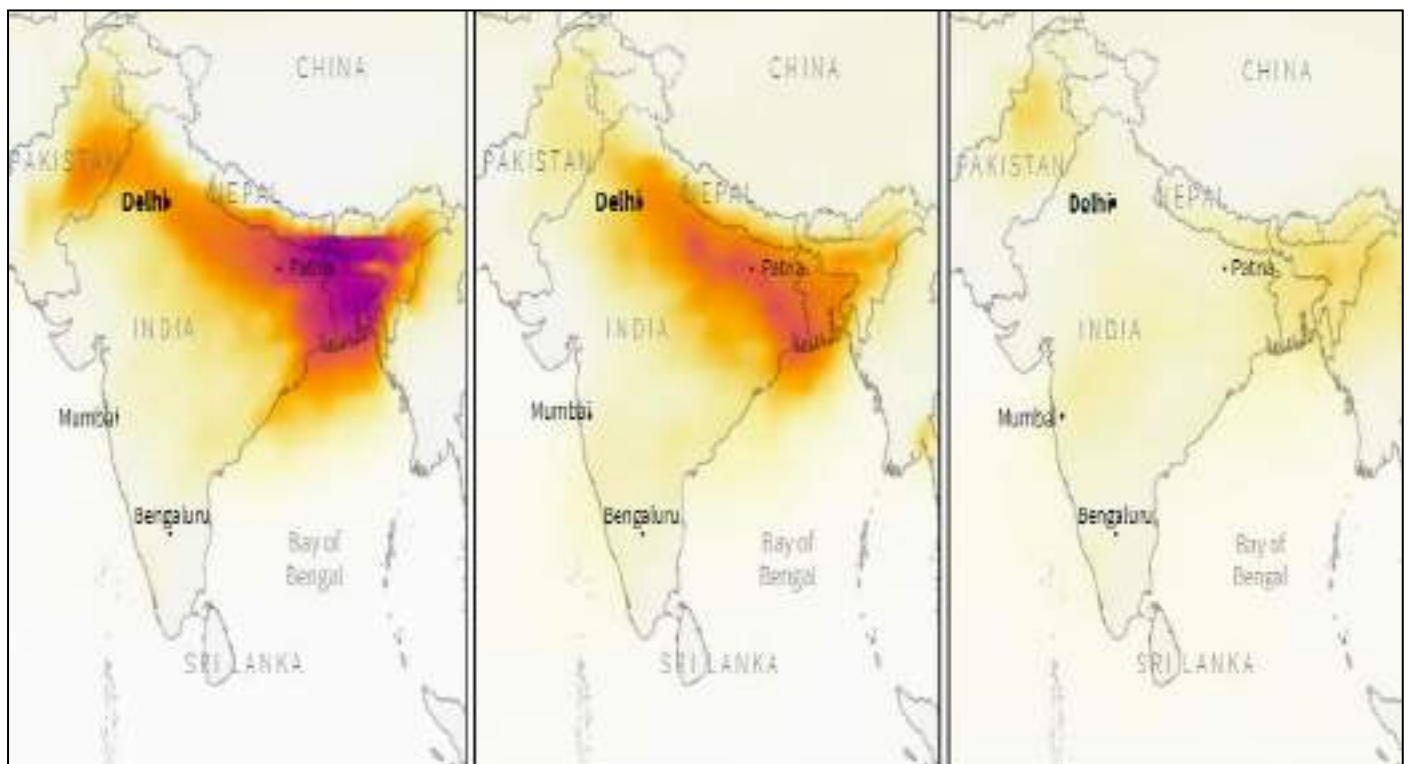
The measures to be implemented should be done while keeping in mind its impact on the environment. As the COVID-19 has made the impossible possible by the reducing the carbon pollutants and improving the overall air quality index over the world.

Air Pollution:

There's a murky relationship between air pollution and coronavirus, clear blue skies over the world's megacities have become a visible mark of the pandemic. It's a welcome change for many, not least because outdoor air pollution kills around 4.2 million people worldwide each year.

To contain the coronavirus pandemic, billions of people have been told to stay at home. The restrictions have sent financial markets into free fall. But they have also given residents in some of the world's most polluted cities something they have not experienced in years: clean air.

Reuters visualisations, based on data from NASA's Global Modelling and Data Assimilation team, show how concentrations of some pollutants fell drastically after the lockdowns started. Satellite observations record information on aerosols in the atmosphere. NASA's model is then able to provide estimates of the distribution of these pollutants close to the Earth's surface.

People in Punjab, India say they can see the snow peaks of the Himalayas, a view that for decades has been blocked by air pollution. New Delhi alone has recorded a 60% drop in fine particulate matter, the world's deadliest air pollutant.

Los Angeles, the traffic-congested city with some of the highest smog levels in the U.S., has seen nitrogen levels drop significantly and rush-hour traffic essentially vanish.

The below picture shows the India Gate war memorial on October 17, 2019, months before the nationwide lockdown. The bottom picture shows the memorial after air pollution levels began to drop during the lockdown in New Delhi on April 8.



Where, in Mumbai people are stunned and surprised by the sight they have seen from the window which the Mumbaikars have never seen in the past decades. People from around the city started sharing more pictures that indicate how humans in quarantine are proving to be a blessing for our planet and showcasing their love for nature.



Despite the rare glimpse of natural beauty like snow-crested mountains and clearer skylines, scientists warn against celebrating any short-term benefits from the decline in air pollution since levels will rebound once global restrictions lift.

One of the biggest blessings of COVID-19 to the humans is the healing of the largest hole in the Ozone layer spreading over 1 million sq km above the Arctic.

The ozone layer which envelops the earth is crucial in maintaining a balance of climatic conditions and also for keeping ocean currents on their natural course and helps in absorbing harmful ultraviolet rays of the sun and prevents it from directly reaching the surface of the earth.

However, activities of human beings over the past few decades have led to the depletion of the layer. That, in turn, had thrown ocean currents off their usual course but the ozone layer has now begun to repair itself, thanks to the COVID-19 and associated lockdowns in many countries.

Water Pollution:

As India grows and urbanizes, its water bodies are getting toxic. It's estimated that around 70% of surface water in India is unfit for consumption. India's water bodies are in a poor state. In the name of economic growth, most rivers and streams have been turned into sewer canals and are getting difficult to be treated. It is estimated that every day, almost 40 million litres of wastewater enters rivers and other water bodies; only 37 per cent is adequately treated.

The Ganga water quality improved remarkably during the lockdown period. The 2,500-kilometre river has been an important part of India's history, identity, religious beliefs and economy for thousands of years. But the river became a dumpyard for untreated sewage and industrial waste.

According to CPCB, more than half of wastewater treatment plants in the basin do not comply with the discharge norms. Since 1985, several programmes and schemes have been launched to clean the Ganga. It began with the Ganga Action Plan I, followed by Ganga Action Plan II.

In 2015, the biggest-ever initiative, NamamiGange was launched with a budget of over Rs 20,000. Despite numerous programmes and huge funds, the Ganga still runs polluted.



Amid the nationwide lockdown to contain the spread of the Covid-19 outbreak, the water quality of river Ganga at Har-ki-Pauri in the holy city of Haridwar has been classified as 'fit for drinking', an unprecedented success which the ambitious schemes of the government could not do for years even after pumping thousands of crores.

The closure of industrial units in Delhi-NCR during the lockdown led to an apparent improvement in water quality of the Yamuna river as the tons of toxic wastes and effluents are no more discharged into it.

Many industries and offices are closed due to the lockdown these days and therefore the Yamuna is looking cleaner these days. The stoppage of industrial pollutants and industrial waste has definitely had a positive effect on water quality. We will conduct testing of the water to ascertain the percentage of improvement in the quality.

The AAP leader said that the results during the lockdown have confirmed his party's hopes that the Yamuna river can be cleaned and added that it could be carried out in the future with the participation of the people.

Similarly, Cauvery and its tributaries in Karnataka are regaining their decades-old status in terms of water quality, informs the Karnataka State Pollution Control Board (KSPCB).

The lockdown has also breathed life into polluted creeks and rivers in the Mumbai region as industrial effluent and other waste that flows into them daily has reduced in volume by 50 percent.

Land Pollution:

Due to rising number of cases in India amid COVID-19. The Health Ministry has urged all states and union territories to ban sale of non-smoking tobacco products and spitting in public places to prevent the spread of coronavirus infection.

Raising concerns about the potential risk of spreading coronavirus through users of tobacco products, as smokeless tobacco users have a tendency to spit in public places, which increases health risks especially spreading contagious diseases like COVID-19.

Use of smokeless tobacco also creates an unhygienic environment which further spreads the diseases. Large gathering at the retail outlets where smokeless tobacco products are sold, also pose the risk of spread of COVID-19.

The restrictions will ultimately increase the of the land whereby reducing the land pollution and will also curb the spread of coronavirus in India.



Under the consolidated revised guidelines issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), spitting has been made punishable with a fine under Section 51 (b) of the Disaster Management Act.

Spitting in public spaces shall be punishable with a fine. However strict monitoring will be required for effective implementation of the orders issued by the Ministry.

Spitting in public is an offence under municipal laws in various cities, but it is hardly taken seriously by the people in the country. Because of the same the ministry has issued fresh guidelines for making it a strict offence.

The sight and sounds of birds replaced car horns and many other sources of noise pollution in Kolkata, amid the nationwide lockdown to curb the spread of the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19).


This was an unprecedented phenomenon, according to several of the city's residents. Kolkata's air and noise pollution were reduced by 50-75 per cent during the lockdown, according to data released by the West Bengal Pollution Control Board.

Birds had reclaimed a part of their lost territory, said Sujata Basu, a resident of a posh locality in south Kolkata. "I saw and heard the calls of different kinds of birds that I hardly knew about, since the imposition of the lockdown," said Sk Selim, an auto rickshaw driver who stays at a slum in North Kolkata.



"The types and numbers of birds in the open have both increased, with far less ambient noise and air pollution and human interference," Rudra said.

It was not just the number of birds, but also their activities across the city that had increased as well, according to Shakti Ranjan Banerjee, a former director of the World Wildlife Fund in West Bengal.



For nearly a month, there's been no honking, no whirr of vehicular engines, no echo of loudspeakers and no clanking of machinery in factories. For nearly a month since the lockdown was clamped, Delhiites have been waking up to the chirping of birds.

Experts, however, said the lockdown was not particularly good for those birds whose survival depends on food remnants scattered by humans across the city, something hardly being done anymore.

Conclusion:

The novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic poses a cruel choice to the world: the society and economy. It has revealed the vulnerabilities and strengths of every country and has taught us a series of lifelong lessons.

A pattern emerges from analysing the approach of countries that have tackled the COVID-19 outbreak successfully. First, accept the problem. The countries that accepted COVID-19 to be a serious problem and not a hoax, saw a less damaging impact of the disease.

Fourth, engage with all stakeholders and take collaborative actions. The world has seen that rich economies that delayed in accepting the problem, failed miserably. On the other hand, countries that were least affected by COVID-19, proactively accepted the problem and followed this process.

COVID-19 is a blessing as well as an eye-opener. Blessings for the mother EARTH as it has become "Super year for Nature". It is an eye-opener for the society and government who were pumping and putting all the efforts to make environment more and more sustainable for all the living creatures. But at the end, all were unable to show case results which we have seen in last 2 months of lockdown. Where quality of air of the most polluted cities like New Delhi, London, Las Vegas, Mumbai, etc. has improved dramatically and the pollutants in the air has reduced to a minimal levels.

COVID-19 not only improved the quality of air but also has improved the quality of water significantly and making the polluted water drinkable. “Ganga” the holy river of India and one of the most polluted rivers. Ganga is now making sense to the name given for the river i.e. the holiest water. The water in Ganga has now become drinkable which was a long quest for the government since 1986 has been achieved in just 2 months.

The advantages of reduction in Land Pollution and Noise Pollution amid COVID-19, will increase the quality of living and simultaneously will increase the expected life of a human.

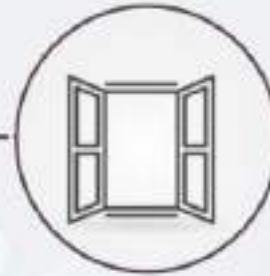

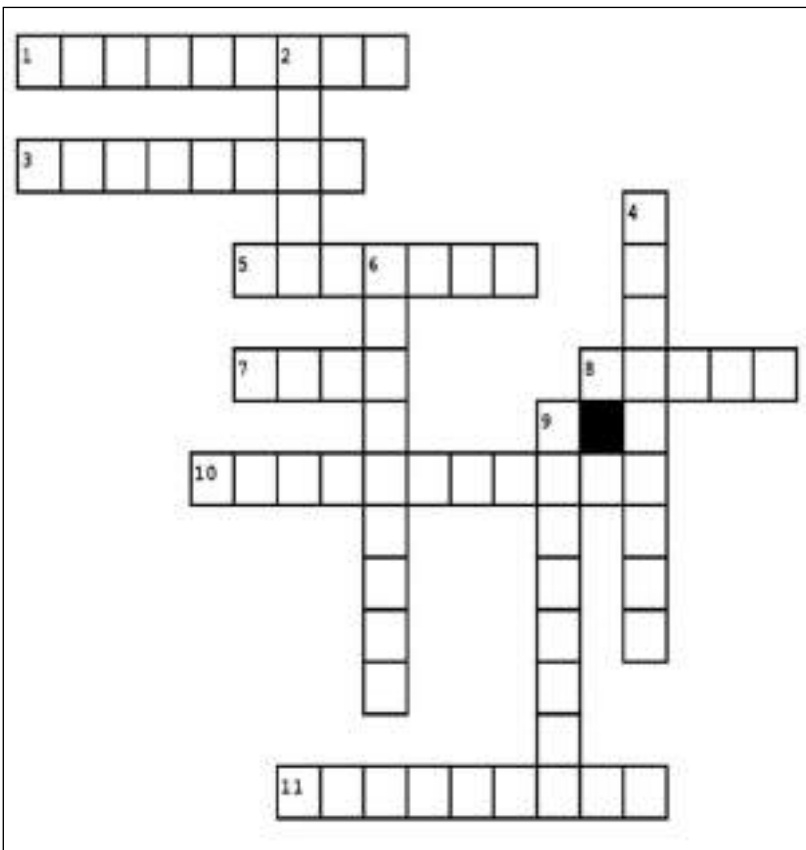

WHAT IS PLASMA THERAPY?

When a person is infected with the coronavirus, his/her immune system creates antibodies to fight the virus. These antibodies build up over time and are accumulated in the plasma. Plasma refers to the liquid element in the blood. Many doctors believe that plasma therapy will be helpful for COVID-19 patients who cannot be benefited by other treatment forms.

HOW DOES A PLASMA DONATION HAPPEN?



In a plasma-only donation, the liquid portion of the donor's blood is separated from the cells. Blood is drawn from one arm and sent through a high-tech machine that collects the plasma.



The donor's red blood cells and platelets are then returned to the donor along with some saline. The process is safe and only takes a few minutes longer than donating whole blood.



Donated plasma is frozen within 24 hours of being donated to preserve its valuable clotting factors. It can be stored for up to one year and thawed for transfusion to a patient when needed.

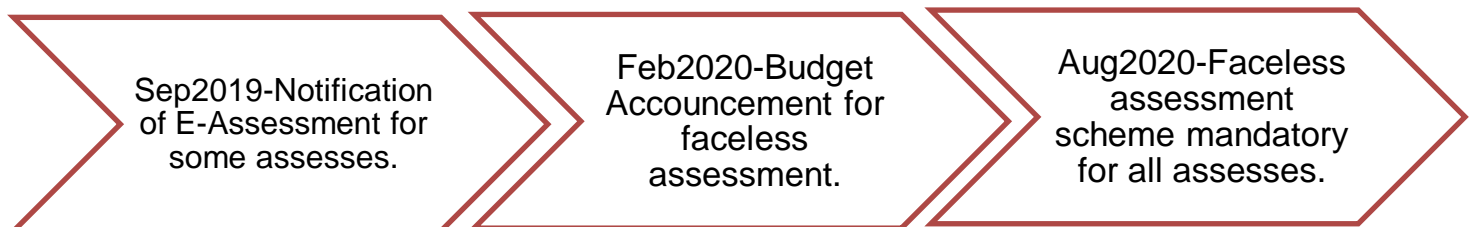
OVERVIEW OF FACELESS ASSESSMENT AND FACELESS APPEAL SCHEME

Faceless Assessment:

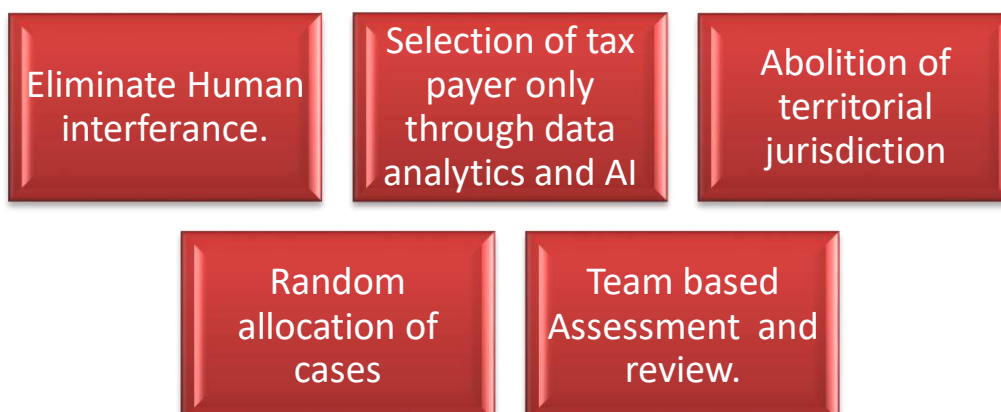
From 13th August 2020, the e-assessment scheme of 2019 amended and hence known as Faceless assessment scheme. The Faceless assessment scheme applies to scrutiny assessment and best judgment assessment. In the union budget 2019, the Finance Minister proposed the introduction of the scheme of faceless assessment. The Scheme lays down the procedure to carry out faceless assessment through electronic mode.

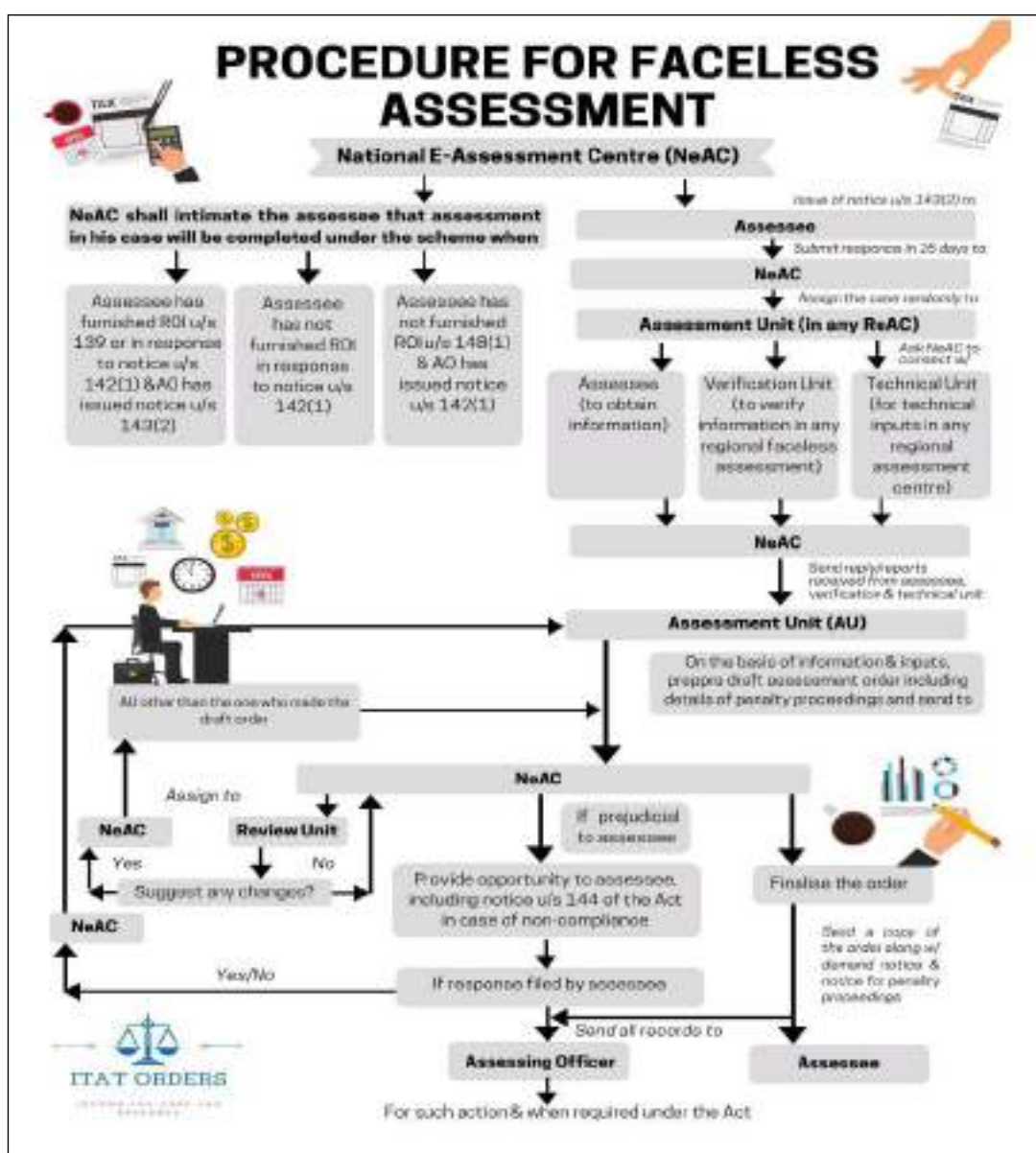

FACELESS APPEALS:

1. Concept of Appeals:-



Income tax liability is determined by the Assessing Officer first. A tax payer aggrieved by various actions of Assessing Officer can appeal before Commissioner of Income Tax (Appeals). Further appeal can be preferred before the Income Tax Appellate Tribunal. On substantial question of law, further appeal can be filed before the High Court and even to the Supreme Court. Various appellate procedures at different levels of appellate authority are defined hereunder:

- **Appeal to Commissioner of Income-tax (Appeals)**
- **Appeal to Income-tax Appellate Tribunal**
- **Appeal to High Court**
- **Appeal to Supreme Court**

2. Welcoming the new initiative of Transparent taxation:-

“The government is now focusing on making tax-paying seamless, painless, faceless” PM

Prime Minister **Narendra Modi** on 13th August 2020 launched a platform for **"Transparent Taxation - Honoring the Honest"** government goes ahead with its tax reform journey. He elaborated that the platform has major reforms like Faceless Assessment, Faceless Appeal and Taxpayers Charter.

He said that Faceless Assessment and Taxpayers Charter have come into force from 13th August 2020 while the facility of faceless appeal will be available for

citizens across the country from 25th September 2020 i.e. Deen Dayal Upadhyay's birth anniversary. The new platform apart from being faceless is also aimed at boosting the confidence of the taxpayer and making him/her fearless.

Advantages of Faceless appeal:-

- As per the new reforms, Faceless Appeals aims to add more trust, transparency in the system. Under this, appeals made by a taxpayer will be randomly allotted to any Income Tax officer in the country.
- The identity of officers deciding appeal will remain unknown.
- A taxpayer won't need to visit the officer or the office.
- The appellate decision will be team-based and reviewed.

Exceptions are:-

Exceptions will be made only in cases relating to:

- Serious frauds, major tax evasion, sensitive and search matters.
- International tax
- Black Money Act and Benami Property.

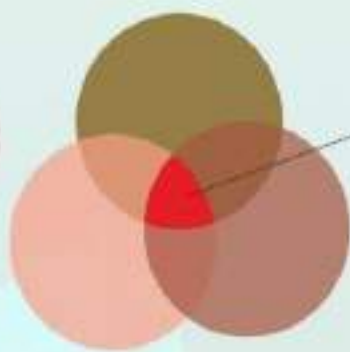
